With winter just about behind us now, the patrols would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the students who really helped out by following the rules at the bus stops. All of the seasons are rough, but winter sometimes is especially tough because of snow and ice. Many of us are tempted to throw snowballs or slide,

but fortunately these temptations were avoided while walking to the bus stop or standing at the stop waiting for the bus. So -- thank you, thank you and thank you!

Here are a few reminders for warmer weather rules: If you bring a ball to school, remember that it is to be played with at recess - not on the way to the bus stop or while standing at the bus stop.

Also, if you walk to the stop with a friend, please continue; however, remember that you are not allowed to stop off at your friend's house to pick her/him up. Meet your friend at the driveway or at the steps. Look out your window and when you see your friend approaching, get your books, lunch, etc., and go out to greet your friend. By remembering these rules you can help make your patrols' jobs much easier.

Last - since some of you enjoy flying kites during the windy weather, here are a few safety tips to follow:

- 1. Always fly your kite in an open area away from electric lines or radio or T. V. antennae.
- Please don't use any metal or wire on your kite.
- Don't fly your kite in the rain or during a thunderstorm.
- Wear some gloves to avoid string burn.

- 5. Don't fly your kite higher than 400 feet.
- 6. If your kite gets caught on a power line, call the power company. DO NOT TRY TO PULL IT DOWN OR DO NOT ATTEMPT TO CLIMB UP TO GET IT.

With the many varieties of kites, this hobby can be an enjoyable one. Follow the rules and have a great time!

Two problems need our special attention. Your help and cooperation will be greatly appreciated in solving these minor areas:


Medication In School: Without going into detail and elaborating on the ramifications of administering medications to students, we need to remind parents that we are not permitted to administer medication to students.

If your child is ill and needs medication, you have a legal reason for keeping your child at home. We will be happy to provide homework and other materials to help during the days of recuperation.

If your child needs to continue medications after returning to school, it is the responsibility of the parent to administer this medication. Medication should not be at school with children.

Telephone: We are asking for parent assistance in helping us reduce the number of message relaying calls incoming to Espe. Many parents have indicated a problem getting an open line to the building. Outgoing calls are also being prioritized to make our line more available. Please evalu-

ate calls designed to convey messages to children. Many of these calls can be avoided by limiting these to only those dealing with emergency situations. Of course, calls dealing with school business are very much encouraged.
